<u>May 18, 2017</u>

<u>May 22, 2017</u>

Monday morning everyone was getting prepared to leave and go their separate ways. During morning coffee and donuts many pictures of groups, people and their buses were taken to help all put faces with names, RVs and new friends. Best routes & directions were clarified.

Harpers were invited to follow Pat and Nickie MacPhail, in 'Olde Violet' to their home to Chilliwack, BC. They traveled down the beautiful, scenic Thompson and Frazier River Canyons, enjoyed more gracious BC hospitality, and stayed overnight in MacPhail's driveway, before heading south to their home in Kelso.

The Crane's and the Goldsby's decided to head further North and check this area out on up to Rebelstoke, BC. From there they drove SE to Gelona Bay and a free ferry boat ride across the Upper Arrow Lake and the little Indian town of Nakusp. A few miles down the road we were able to get into Summit Lake

Provincial Campgrounds. Got to back right up to the lake with the clearest cold mirror image water. From there we headed down 6S to New Denver; then headed East on 31A, which was quite the climb. Streams were running over their banks and the waterfalls were crashing down. The road pretty much follows the river, as it gets bigger to empty into Kootenay Lake at Kalso BC.

We were able to find another BC state type campground at Kokanee Creek. Great parks. Tom had to do some electrical work to get power to their coach. We decided to stay a second night so we could check out the area at Nelson BC. Beautiful old homes and stone architectural churches and courthouses built on a steep hillside. From there the group went back to Kalso to look at the old town buildings dating back to the late 1800's and a tour of the SS Moyle, the worlds oldest in tacked passenger sternwheeler built in 1898, and worked until 1957 in the area. It is one of the smallest sternwheelers weighing in at only 834.7 tons.

We finished our last day in Canada crossing back into the good ole USA at the Nelway border crossing. Crossing went well except the Goldsby's bus didn't want to start when it was their turn to pull up for inspection. Tom did a little wire wiggling and they were on the road again.

From there we headed to Pat and Ann Horn's in Spokane for a few days lay over and to tighten the R side drive axle bolts on the Crane's bus, *must be all the Cat power*. The Horn's were great hosts and we all enjoyed our visit.

From there the Crane's headed home and the Goldsby's went on to a family gathering at Boardman.
